








Cattle Rearing in Rwandan Perspective

 - √ Food security








- ☐ After 1994 Genocide against Tutsi: virtually left with no livestock.
- ☐ From 1994 to date, the country has been restocking with improved dairy cattle breeds through various development programs
 - ✓ Importation of pure exotic breeds by individual farmers as well as partners (Heifer international, Send a cow; Bothar International and others
 - ✓ Government support program called "One cow per poor family PROGRAM", popularly known in Rwanda as 'GIRINKA'; an initiative of the President of REPUBLIC OF RWANDA;.
- ☐ Subsidies on selected Cattle production inputs
- ☐ Construction of Milk Collection Centres across the country and Milk collection points








Genetic Composition of Rwandan Cattle



One Cow per poor family aka Girinka Program

- Girinka Program was initiated in 2006 by H.E. Paul KAGAME, the President of the Republic
 of
 Rwanda;
- One of the Home Grown initiatives to fight against poverty, malnutrition and promote social cohesion in a society coming out of the ashes of the genocide against
 Tutsi
 of
 1994;
- A poor family receives a pregnant heifer with a package of medicines and feeds for 6 months;
- The receiving family is required to pass the first female calf to the next poor family on the list and the process continues;
- To date 354,713 of them have received cows









Impact of Girinka Program

☐ Social impact

- > Improvement in the social welfare of receiving families;
- Increase in income to enable access to health services; education, improved nutrition, better shelter, increased household equipment (TV, Radio, phone,...);
- ➤ Social cohesion; decision making.

☐ Economic impact

- ➤ Participation in Increase of in-country milk production;
- Rwanda was able to start school milk program;
- >Improved agriculture production;
- Improved environment protection.











Integrated Development Programs (IDP) Model Villages

- Rwanda Vision 2020 plans to settle 70% of rural population in viable planned settlements
- IDP Model villages are one of the mechanisms to implement the rural resettlement by relocating and settling households that are located in high risk zones
- On national basis, 44 IDP model villages have been developed throughout the country
- Girinka is an integral part of this model








One Cup Of Milk per Child

- Launched in May 2010 to:
 - ✓ Improve nutrition status of children attending school;
 - ✓ Enhance development of brain capacity of children;
 - ✓ Promote school retention of children attending pre & primary schools (3- 9 years old)












Job Creation in Dairy Sector

- ✓ Youth involvement in milk collection, transportation and trade
- ✓ Increasing number of cottage industries for dairy products
 - involving youth in cooperatives
- ✓ Increased number of women in milk marketing as individuals and in cooperatives



- ✓ Stimulated youth in ICT to develop famer friendly applications informing stakeholders on various production and services
- ✓ Increased financial services and trustworthiness to access loans thus attracting entry of many persons into dairy farming activities
